## Highlights of the Week:

learnt a lot about where our food comes from.





October is Black History Month, but Black History, like the history of women's fight for the right to vote, or of disabled people's rights, are simply part of human history that have been (until recently) left out of the story, leaving us without a full picture of who we were and who we are now.

Our classes have or will each look at different contributions in their history lessons. This is one of our ancestors – the oldest complete Homo Sapiens skeleton found in Britain – that Beech class have learned about.



He lived 10,000 years ago and was found in 1903, in Gough's Cave, Cheddar Gorge, Somerset (which is why he is called Cheddar Man). This reconstruction was created more recently, from a careful analysis of

the DNA in his skeleton.

His combination of blue/green eyes and dark skin is striking and tells us a lot about our ancestors. Dark or pale skin is an adaptation to different levels of sunlight. Dark skin has more melanin, which is better at protecting our skin from damaging UV light in sunny climates, whereas pale skin is better at absorbing vitamin D in cloudy climates.

Cheddar Man, and other Stone Age people found across Europe, show us that the melanin-rich skin associated with Africa and the Mediterranean was common for Mesolithic humans throughout Europe. It is further evidence that all human life originated in Africa and that all humans are part of one race: the human race.
